Conservative Opinion Leaders: 'Corporate Welfare' Sugar Program Needs Reform in Farm Bill

Leading conservative opinion leaders are calling on Congress to recognize the opportunity at hand to reform the Depression-era U.S. sugar program in the farm bill.

Mike Collins, Former Spokesman, Republican National Committee:

"... The program is one of Washington's sweetest examples of corporate welfare. ... Sugar producers' profits are propped up to the tune of \$1.4 billion a year regardless of their global competitiveness, while American households pay \$2.4 billion more for nearly everything they eat and drink."

Council for Citizens Against Government Waste:

"... [Those] who voted against taxpayers, consumers, and free markets in favor of subsidies, setasides and special interests when they voted against sugar reform ... proved themselves more loyal to sugar producers and corporate welfare than the welfare of ordinary citizens. ... Since the overall farm bill was defeated, there will be an opportunity ... to stand up for taxpayers ... [and] to reform one of the nation's most egregious examples of wasteful spending."

Only Congress can fix a program that hurts U.S. consumers, taxpayers, food manufacturers and their workers with simple reforms to the Farm Bill.
